The why, why not, of repeating

Only four college football teams have repeated as national champion since the mid-1970s. Can Ohio State do it this season?

FIVE REASONS OHIO STATE WILL REPEAT:

1. The schedule.

Virginia Tech, Penn State and Minnesota appear to be the only opponents who will be even somewhat challenging for Ohio State before late November when it plays Michigan State and Michigan back to back to end the regular season.

2. Talent.

OSU has two quarterbacks who could start almost anywhere in the country and another quarterback who could become one of its best receivers. It has a Heisman Trophy candidate running back and a first-round NFL draft choice on the defensive line. The list goes on and on.

3. Urban Meyer.

OSU's coach has won three national championships. He has done this before.

4. Experience

Ohio State learned what happens if you aren't properly prepared for a game when it lost to Virginia Tech last season. It learned how to play under extreme pressure when just winning the Big Ten championship game wasn't enough, it had to win it big time. And it learned it could beat the big dogs in college football when it knocked off Alabama and Oregon.

5. Unselfishness.

For a team that has been the toast of college football since January, OSU has done a good job of keeping the focus on the team, not the individuals. The players have had fun with it but seemed to know where the line they shouldn't cross was, with the exception of the four who will be sitting out the Virginia Tech game.

FIVE REASONS OHIO STATE WON'T REPEAT:

1. The schedule.

Michigan State comes to OSU on Nov. 21 for a huge game a week before the Buckeyes go to Michigan. And that would be followed by the Big Ten championship game and two play-off games.

2. Stuff happens.

A turnover at the wrong time, an injury, a suspension or the whole team just not being ready to play against a good, but not great opponent could bring a dream season to a screeching halt.

3. Defensive line questions.

Defensive lineman Adolphus Washington disagreed when a reporter at Big Ten media days suggested there were questions about Ohio State's defensive line this season. "Who says that?" Washington asked.

But there are questions about the defensive line. Joey Bosa looks like a first-round NFL draft pick and Washington looks like he has a chance to play on Sundays. But OSU must get a decent pass rush from the defensive end opposite Bosa and Michael Bennett will not be replaced easily.

4. The kicking game.

Ohio State's offense was so efficient at getting touchdowns that Sean Nuernberger hitting only 13 of 20 field goal attempts didn't matter last season. He is untested in situations where the outcome of the game depends on a field goal.

5. Something no one is thinking about.

Winning it all last year with a third-team quarterback was a surprise. Losing this year could also come from a surprise.

OSU is everyone's target

COLUMBUS — The last flake of confetti in the postgame celebration had barely settled onto the turf after Ohio State's 42-20 win over Oregon in the national championship game when someone somewhere probably started talking about next year.

Next year is here and the Buckeyes are everyone's No. 1 team in the preseason polls.

The last team to repeat as national champion was Alabama in 2011 and 2012. USC won at least a share of the title in 2003 and 2004. Going back a little more, Nebraska had back-to-back poll championships in 1994 and 1995 and Oklahoma was ranked No. 1 in 1974 and 1975.

Closer to home, Ohio State came up a little short the last two times it had a chance to repeat.

Michigan's legendary upset of the Buckeyes in 1969 derailed OSU's hopes of going back to back after being No. 1 in 1968.

And in 2003, Ohio State lost early to Wisconsin and lost at Michigan when it still might have reached the BCS championship game with a win over its biggest rival. The Buckeyes finished both those seasons ranked No. 4.

With two national championships at Florida (2006, 2008) OSU coach Urban

Meyer is not a newcomer to trying to win back-to-back national championships.

The 2007 Gators lost many of the key players from the team which dominated Ohio State 41-14 in the national championship game, finished 9-4 and were ranked No. 13. Meyer's 2009 team was ranked No. 1 all season until a loss to No. 2 Alabama in the SEC championship game. That team finished No. 3 in the polls.

Meyer says holding the national championship trophy again is not something Ohio State is talking about going into this season.

"Repeat is not a conversation," Meyer said during spring practice. At the Big Ten media days in July, he banned another word. "We don't use the word 'defend'," he said.

Senior offensive tackle Taylor Decker said the idea that this year is a clean slate with no carryover from last season is a theme the coaching staff has emphasized.

"That's over. It's cool but it's done," Decker said about last year's national championship. "Obviously, the spotlight is on us more than ever. People will tell you how great you are but you don't want to start believing all that hype. That can make you believe that just

because we're Ohio State we'll go out and win every game we play."

Maybe that caution is understandable. The last time the preseason No. 1 in The Associated Press college football poll won the national championship was USC in 2004. And the last time Ohio State was No. 1 in the preseason, its 2006 season ended with the loss to Florida in the BCS championship game.

Offense could get even better

COLUMBUS — When the All-Big Ten football team as voted by the league's coaches was announced on Dec. 1, Ezekiel Elliott's name was absent.

He wasn't on the first team. Or the second team. Not even honorable mention.

Six week later he was one of the top contenders for this year's Heisman Trophy.

A combination of a slow start by Elliott and an abundance of good Big Ten running backs, like Wisconsin's Melvin Gordon, Indiana's Tevin Coleman, Minnesota's David Cobb and Nebraska's Ameer Abdullah, probably is the best explanation for the snub.

But no one is overlooking Elliott this year after a huge postseason meant he ended the season with 1,878 yards rushing,

more than any Ohio State running back except Eddie George's 1,927 yards in 1995.

Elliott rushed for 220 yards in the Big Ten championship game, 230 yards in the Sugar Bowl win over Alabama and carried 36 times for 246 yards and four touchdowns in OSU's 42-20 win over Oregon in the national championship game.

His 696 yards in the postseason were more than Ohio State's leading rusher for the season had in 2004, 1987, 1978, 1971 and every year from 1962-1967.

Ohio State scored 44.8 points a game last season, which was first in the Big Ten and fifth nationally. And the Buckeyes might have the talent to score more points this year.



quarterback, either J.T. Barrett or Cardale Jones, will be operating behind an offensive line with four returning starters from the group that dominated Wisconsin, Alabama and Oregon last year. Guard Pat Elflein was a first-team All-Big Ten selection and tackle Taylor Decker was on the second team.

Barrett was voted first-team All-Big Ten after his brilliant work as an emergency replacement for Braxton Miller. He threw for 2,834 yards and a Big Ten-high 34 touchdowns before a broken ankle in the Michigan

game ended his season.

Then Jones emerged from backup quarterback obscurity to deliver an even more surprising relief effort. He threw for 257 yards, 243 yards and 242 yards and a total of five touchdowns against Wisconsin, Alabama and Oregon.

Whoever wins the starting quarterback job will have lots of targets to throw to, especially when Jalin Marshall, Dontre

Wilson and Corey Smith return after serving a one-game suspension in the opener at Virginia Tech.

Wide receiver Michael Thomas (54 catches, 799 yards, 9 TDs) was last year's leading receiver. Marshall caught 38 passes, six of them for touchdowns and tight end Nick Vannett had five touchdown receptions. Young receivers like Parris Campbell, Johnnie

Dixon, James Clark and maybe Torrance Gibson could get onto the field.

The big question mark is who will replace Devin Smith as the deep threat among the receivers.

That answer could be Miller, who announced a move to receiver after sitting out last

season with a shoulder injury. The two-time Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year as a quarterback has 12 running plays of more than 40 yards in his career. Miller has looked good in practice according to teammates, so an already explosive offense might have just become even more productive.

Defense strong at every level

COLUMBUS — It's easy to forget three years later how threadbare the linebacker position was at Ohio State when Urban Meyer arrived in 2012.

Now that position might be one of the strengths of a championship level defense. Now all three units of OSU's defense — line, linebackers, defensive backs — are playing from a position of strength.

During last year's Ohio State national championship run, Darron Lee introduced himself in spectacular fashion in his first season of playing after being redshirted as a freshman. Joshua Perry turned the potential OSU saw in him when it recruited him into production.

And 5-star recruit Raekwon

Some of his biggest plays have been on the biggest of stages, including an at-the-end-zone interception in the fourth quarter against No. 1 Alabama in the Sugar Bowl, and an interception vs. Wisconsin in the Big Ten title game.

McMillan showed enough in a back-up role to quiet any questions about his ability to step

in as a full-time player at middle linebacker this season.

It's quite a change from 2012, and even 2013, when Ryan Shazier was putting up ridiculous numbers (39 tackles for losses, 11 sacks in his final two seasons) and the rest of the linebacker group was several rungs below the future first-round draft choice of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Ohio State was so needy at linebacker in 2012 that Meyer asked senior starting fullback Zach Boren to switch to linebacker during the season, even though he hadn't played the position since high school. And Boren quickly established himself as the second-best linebacker on the team behind Shazier.

Last season, Perry led Ohio State in tackles with 124 and had 8.5 tackles for losses. Lee led the team with 16.5 tackles for losses,

was second in sacks with 7.5, was third in tackles with 81, intercepted two passes and returned two fumbles for touchdowns. Even without a starting job, McMillan cracked the top 10 in tackles with 54 and had 6.5 tackles for losses.

The goal this year is to keep on moving forward, Perry says. "We can't have any slip-ups and no steps backward," he said.

Perry called OSU's defense a "no-name" defense in the sense that no one puts themselves first before the team.

But there is no denying the star power of first-team All-

American defensive end Joey Bosa. The junior will be a first-round draft choice next spring if he chooses to enter the NFL draft. He was one of the dominant defensive linemen in college football last season with 13.5 sacks and 21 tackles for losses.

The key to Bosa avoiding double teams and replicating those numbers might be the development of a credible pass rushing threat from the other defensive end. Sophomore Tyquan Lewis will get the first chance at playing that role.

Adolphus Washington will

move from nose guard to the position Michael Bennett played last season and could become even more of a playmaker than he was when he had 10.5 tackles for losses and 4.5 sacks in 2014. Senior Tommy Schutt, who arrived as a 4-star recruit but has not lived up to that billing so far, will probably start at the other

interior defensive line position.

The defensive backfield has three returning starters – safeties Vonn Bell and Tyvis Powell and cornerback Eli Apple. Gareon Conley is expected to start at the other cornerback position.

J.T. or Cardale? A st

COLUMBUS — The question of who will be Ohio State's starting quarterback is the biggest story of the 2015 season for last year's national champions.

But coach Urban Meyer is in no hurry to reveal whether J.T. Barrett or Cardale Jones will start for the Buckeyes. He says everyone will find out when they see who jogs out for Ohio State's first offensive series in its opener at Virginia Tech on Sept. 7.

The back-up quarterback often becomes the most popular player on a football team because no one has seen him play much or have to perform under pressure.

But both the winner and the loser in the battle to be Ohio State's starter will be two of the most popular players on the roster because of what they did on the field.

Barrett rescued the regular season when he stepped in for the injured Braxton Miller and led the

Buckeyes to an 11-1 record. Then, after Barrett went out with a broken ankle against Michigan, Jones was successful beyond all expectations in leading Ohio State to wins in the Big Ten championship game, the Sugar Bowl and the national championship game.


For a while it looked like Ohio State would have a three-way race for the starting quarterback job. But when Braxton Miller decided to move to wide receiver it became a head-to-head duel between Barrett and Jones.

Barrett completed 64 percent of his passes for 2,834 yards and a school-record 34 touchdowns before his injury. He also rushed for 938 yards, including nine games of 70 yards or more.

Jones threw only 17 passes all season before the Big Ten championship game. But in the three postseason games he completed 61 percent of his passes for 257 yards against Wisconsin, 243 against Alabama and 242 in the national championship game against Oregon.

THE CASE FOR J.T. BARRETT

Urban Meyer didn't start Tim Tebow at Florida because he threw the ball perfectly. He picked Tebow because he ran Meyer's offense better. That's Barrett.

Strong case for each

Each brings his own set of strengths to the field. Jones has one of the strongest arms in college football. He is not as good at running the option as Barrett but at 250 pounds he can run over defenders.

Barrett is the better runner and looks more comfortable than Jones when running the option. Meyer questioned his arm strength when he first got to Ohio State but says he is now satisfied with Barrett's ability to "throw a rope" 50 of 60 yards.

Both players say they think there should be a winner emerge from preseason practice as the No. 1 quarterback. A two-quarterback system got a thumbs down from Barrett and Jones.

"I did that in high school. As a quarterback it's kind of tough because you can't get a real vibe off the defense and how they're trying to play you," Barrett said.

Jones said, "I don't think that would be a great idea. I don't think you could get into a

rhythm. But if we do that, I'm pretty sure Coach Meyer would find a way to make it work."

During spring practice, Jones got most of the time with the first team because Barrett was still recovering from the broken ankle he suffered in the Michigan game. But the ankle is back to normal and won't be a factor in deciding who wins the starting job.

Barrett pointed to a time he ran past Joey Bosa during practice as proof his ankle is all the way back.

"I went right around him. I thought I wouldn't have as much giddy-up, but I've still got it," he said.

Meyer called the competition "one of the most refreshing competitions I've ever witnessed."

"This one is very genuine. They really encourage each other, they really push each other," he said.



Will the defense, which gave up more than 30 points six times last season, improve enough to take some pressure off the offense?

Returning starters: 11 (6 offense, 4 defense, kicker)

Players to watch: QB Caleb Rowe, WR Marcus Leak, RB Brandon Ross, CB Will Likely

The big questions: Can quarterback Caleb Rowe stay healthy after playing only 13 games his first three seasons? Can the defense, which wasn't stellar last season, be effective with six new starters on the front seven? Will cornerback Will Likely (6 interceptions, 2 for TDs) convince an NFL team to take a chance on a 5-foot, 7-inch defensive back?

Coach's quote: "We found out it (Big Ten) is really a lineman's league. You better be able to control the line of scrimmage if you're going to give yourself a chance to win." — Randy Edsall

MICHIGAN

Returning starters: 13 (6 offense, 7 defense)

Players to watch: QB Jake Rudock, QB Shane Morris, RB Derrick Green, LB James Ross, S JabriCB Jourdan Lewis.

The big questions: Will Jim Harbaugh look like a miracle worker by the end of the season or will returning Michigan to its former status take a while? Will graduate transfer quarterback Jake Rudock start for Michigan after being Iowa's starting QB last year? Will it be last year's backup Shane Morris? Or will it be someone else? Will safety Jabrill Peppers become a star after injuries limited him as a freshman?

Coach's quote: "We're going into a submarine and you won't see us for a while. We'll be working." — Jim Harbaugh

A look at some teams other than Ohio State who could challenge for a place in the College Football Playoff:

ALABAMA

It would be dangerous to count the Crimson Tide out of the national championship picture any season.

Sure, they lost standouts like receiver Amari Cooper and will have a first-year quarterback. But Nick Saban has won two national championships with first-year starters at QB and Alabama's offensive line and defensive front seven remain formidable.

AUBURN

For a team that lost five games last season, Auburn is being men-

tioned a lot as a possibility to go to the College Football Playoff.

Quarterback Jeremy Johnson is a highly regarded passer and freshman Roc Thomas and junior college transfer Javon Robinson are expected to continue Auburn's tradition of being strong in the running game.

The defense could improve with former Florida head coach Will Muschamp's hiring as defensive coordinator.

MICHIGAN STATE

The Spartans should be favored in every game before going to Ohio State on Nov. 21. Quarterback Connor Cook and an offensive line that could challenge OSU's as the best in the Big Ten could make MSU dangerous. But their path to the playoffs would be blocked by a loss at Ohio State.

TCU

The Horned Frogs are one of the teams that thought they deserved a spot in the College Football Playoff last year instead of Ohio State. Trevone Boykin (3,901 yards passing, 707 yards rushing) leads an explosive offense.

BAYLOR

The Bears topped the NCAA total offense statistics last season when they averaged 581.5 yards a game. Baylor coach Art Briles was vocal about his displeasure about being left out of the College Football Playoff, so that could possibly be some motivation for his team this year.

OREGON

The Ducks' star was dimmed a bit by Ohio State's dominating 42-20 win in the national championship game so they might be

a little overlooked as a national championship contender.

USC

Quarterback Cody Kessler is the main reason the Trojans are a contender to reach the postseason. He completed a school-record 69.7 percent of his passes in 2014.

The Irish have a tough schedule and a first-year starter at quarterback, Malik Zaire. But he has a veteran offensive line in front of him and they're solid on defense.

Harbaugh makes rivalry burn hotter

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — It's not all about memories, but Jim Harbaugh certainly has talked a lot about them since he became Michigan's football coach.

He has talked about buying a house in the neighborhood in Ann Arbor where Bo Schembechler lived and about driving the same streets to work as his college coach did. He has talked about growing up there when his dad was a Michigan assistant.

Registering his two young daughters at the same Catholic elementary school he attended and watching them play in the same parks he did as a boy

brought back more memories.

"They're wonderful, good memories," he said at the Big Ten media days.

This look back plays well with an audience starved for the kind of success Michigan had from Schembechler's arrival in 1969 until Lloyd Carr's retirement after the 2007 season.

Michigan did not have a losing season in those 39 years. Since then it has had three, including last season's 5-7 record that brought down the curtain on Brady Hoke's four years as coach. The last time Michigan won a Big Ten championship was in 2004.

Harbaugh's mission is to restore Michigan football. And create some new memories.

Making the Wolverines competitive with their two biggest rivals is also part of the mission. Ohio State has beaten Michigan 12 of the last 14 times they've played and Michigan State has won six of the last seven against its in-state rival.

Harbaugh, who was Michigan's starting quarterback from 1984-86, finished third in the 1986 Heisman Trophy voting. He went on to play 15 years in the NFL.

Turnarounds have been one of the trademarks of his coaching career.

Stanford was 1-11 the year before he got there but improved to four wins, five wins, eight wins and 12 wins


in his four seasons in Palo Alto.

After Stanford, he took over the San Francisco 49ers, who were 6-10 the year before he arrived and had a losing record seven of the eight years before he was hired. The 49ers won 13 games his first season and were in the Super Bowl by his second year.

Harbaugh has claimed more than once he hasn't noticed all the attention and hype that came with his hiring at Michigan. "I haven't seen any circus," he said.

The hope at Michigan is that the circus has left town and Harbaugh will be a difference maker.


