## Lots to do and see at the 2024 Fayette County Fair

"The main reason for the fair is for the vouth of the county," Dr. Bob Schwartz, veterinarian, and president of the Fayette County Agriculture Society, said on a sunny, blue sky day a couple of weeks before the event is with us once again.

The 145th-annual Fayette County Fair is a busy, exciting time, especially for the youth and certainly for folks of all ages.

The Queen will be crowned on Sunday, July 14 at 2:30 p.m. and that is just the beginning of the tradition-filled fair coming our way.

The Guys & Gals Lead is scheduled for 6 p.m. on the 14th at the Sales Arena.

On Monday, July 15, the featured attraction at the McDonald's Grandstand will be a concert by country rock artist Devin Henry.

On Tuesday, July 16, the grandstand will be ready to host the NTPA Truck and Tractor Pull which is set for 7 p.m.

There will be a school bus demo derby at 7 p,m. Thursday. There will be six buses entered this year. Following that will be

two demo derby classes.. Also at the fair Thurs-

day, it's a big day for the young people involved with raising animals as it will be the first of two evenings of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale in the Sales Arena commencing at 5:30 p.m.

On Friday, there is a Stock Truck Pull sponsored by John Hinderer at 6 p.m.

A second session of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale is set for Friday at 5:30 p.m.

On Saturday, there will be another full card of harness racing at the McDonald's Grandstand, starting at 11 a.m. The highlight of the harness racing will be the annual D.E. Mossbarger Fayette County Classic.

"We are happy once again to host the Classic," Schwartz said.

The Pedal Pull is scheduled for 2 p.m. Saturday at the Small Animals Barn.

The Smash-It Demolition Derby is expected to draw a large throng for all of the action, beginning at 7 p.m. For the Saturday card of harness racing, Schwartz said the races will start at 11 a.m., not the more traditional time of noon. "The post time for Wednesday is 5 p.m. and the post time for Saturday is 11 a.m.," Schwartz said. "We're going (at 11 a.m.) because we have two grandstand attractions on Saturday. We have harness racing in the afternoon and then we have the demolition derby Saturday night. "We have quite a bit of congestion with the horsemen leaving at 3 to 4 o'clock and the participants trying to get their cars in and inspected

for the demo derby," Schwartz said. "The time change is just to make the transition a little easier for all concerned."

Wednesday is Community Night at the Races (beginning at 5 p.m.)

"It is a combined effort between the Fayette Ag Society and Travel and Tourism," Schwartz said. "There really are some great prizes to be given away. There will be a raffle drawing after each race on Wednesday night. The sponsor of that race will present the prize for that race."

Race sponsors donating prizes for Wednesday night's race are: Merchants National Bank, Awesome Real Estate, Court House Manor & St. Catherine's, Willis-Clark Agency, Atomic Credit Union, John Hinderer Ford, Key Realty, Tony's Welding & Fabrication, Dis-Tran Steel, Carriage Court, Blue Hippo and FCT & T, FCAS & all sponsors.

Prizes will include a big t.v., a barbecue grill, a drone, a DeWalt workplace radio, a tent, a cooler, a remote controlled car and a chicken coop. Schwartz said you must be present to win one of these prizes. "We have the Signature Series races Wednesday night," Schwartz said. "We have a new sponsor for the Signature Series; it is Lebanon Citizens National Bank. We are happy to welcome them as a major sponsor of the Signature Series race." The Signature Series is contested over 34 county fairs, Schwartz explained. It is for horses who are 4 years of age and up. "They accumulate points and then there is a final at Delaware at the Little Brown Jug," Schwartz said. "It's turned out to be a very nice series. It's two races - a trot and a pace. "Also, we have the

Wednesday, July 17 shapes up as another exciting afternoon and evening at the fair.

First of all, it is Adena Health Day with the first 600 kids, ages 2-18 having free entry and free rides after 2 p.m. (this day only.)

At noon on Wednesday, there will be an as vet to be determined number of wiener dog races that will establish the field for the final championship race at approximately 8:30 p.m., although it may not be held until closer to 9:30 p.m., Schwartz added.

Wednesday is Community Night at the Races. Harness races will begin at 5 p.m. Wednesday.

Thursday, July 18 is Senior Citizen's Day at the fair.

ing Series," Schwartz said. "This is for youngsters who are trying to get started in the business. It would be similar to the minor leagues for baseball — let them get

their feet wet." It's not known until just a very few days beforehand, but Schwartz anticipates a large field of horses taking part in the races Wednesday and Saturday.

"I think we'll have between 12 and 14 races each day," Schwartz said. "There will be pari-mutuel wagering. Patrons can enjoy our new and refurbished grandstand. I think we'll have a lot of good, quality horses, the way the calendar is falling. It should (make for) some very outstanding races.

"The only thing we don't have control over is the weather," Schwartz said. "We certainly hope we have good weather.

"We are very excited about the harness program this year,' Schwartz said. "The numbers (of horses) are up, so we have a larger pool to pull from."

Community Night at the Races is one of the many highlights of the fair, Schwartz said.

"It's gotten bigger every year," Schwartz said. "It's grown each year we've had it.'

There is the abovementioned concert on Monday night featuring Devin Henry, starting at 7:30 p.m.

"He is heavily involved with Ohio State in the pre-game party they have (prior to football games)," Schwartz said. "He is kind of an up and comer. I think he'll put on a good show for

County will enjoy him. "Tuesday we have the NTPA Truck and Tractor Pull," Schwartz said.

Wednesday, we have the qualifying heats of the wiener dog races," Schwartz said. "Each year this event seems to get bigger."

The qualifying heats begin at noon on Wednesday.

From there, the top 10 finishers move on to Wednesday evening's championship race.

A doggie named "Turbo" won the first wiener dog title at the fair in 2021. In 2022 and last year, it was "Henry" as the winner. "Henry" will be going for a three-peat.

"After we have the last harness race, we will have the final wiener dog race," Schwartz said. "We must have two or three hundred people just come out to watch the qualifying heats of the wiener dog races. It's been a well-received event here."

The school bus derby is set for Thursday, which is Senior Citizen's Day at the fair.

'This year there are going to be six buses, instead of five," Schwartz said. Schools involved are Miami Trace, Washington, Greenfield, Fayette Christian School, **Fayette Progressive** School and East Clinton.

Friday night is the Stock Truck Pull beginning at 6 p.m.

Saturday there is another full card of harness racing, starting at 11 a.m. and that evening, starting at 7 p.m.is the Smash It Demolition Derby.

General admission, which includes all grand-

Children 24 months and under will be admitted free.

A pre-sale daily pass is \$8 and a pre-sale weekly pass is \$38.

A daily ride pass is \$16. Rides will begin operating at approximately 3 p.m. Monday. The rest of the week, rides will operate from 1 p.m. until 11 p.m.

A membership ticket admits the holder to the fair each weekday and entitles the holder to vote for directors and to make exhibit entries. These are \$40.

A meal ticket is \$10. These allow patrons to enter the fairgrounds and are good for one hour. They may be redeemed at the gate within the hour.

There is a very spacious parking area on the west side of the fairgrounds and parking is free.

"We as the fair board and Ag Society are very proud of what we've accomplished with the improvements we've made (at the fairgrounds)," Schwartz said. "Each year we try to make improvements to the grounds."

One improvement that should be ready for 2025 will be new aluminum bleachers on the infield, Schwartz said. The current press box will be coming down and a new one erected for next year, Schwartz said.

"We want people to come out and enjoy the fair," Schwartz said. "We're very appreciative of the community support that we've had for the Junior Fair livestock sales. The businesses and local individuals have always stepped up. We've had real strong sales.'

# **Fayette County Fair Queen field narrowed to three**

The field of six 2024 Fayette County Fair Queen candidates was narrowed down to three finalists during the annual Queen's Tea event, held inside the Mahan Building at the Fayette County Fairgrounds on Thursday, June 27.

The six candidates included Maycin Adkins, Kaley Moser, Amberly Szczerbiak, Katie Harris, Jordan Mead and Gracelynn Zimmerman.

After much deliberation, it was revealed later in the evening that the three finalists were Szczerbiak, Moser and Harris.

Queen Director Faith Cottrill-Marine began the evening by welcoming those in attendance and introducing the emcees for the evening, which were 2022 Fayette County Fair Queen Libby Aleshire and First Attendant Hidy Kirkpatrick. Both Aleshire and





# New vendors, renovations coming to Fayette Co. Fair

During the annual Queen's Tea event held Thursday, June 27 inside the Mahan Building at the Fayette County Fairgrounds, fair board vice president Doug Marine spoke to those in attendance about some new things to be on the lookout for during the Fayette County Fair and after.

He first mentioned that the location of the dog tent, where the dog shows are held, will be moved. The new location will be right outside the fine arts building, where the 4-H activity tent used to be. "It will be a little more private and not so much hustle and bustle being by the gate back there where it was and has been for awhile," said Marine.

He then discussed some new food vendors that will be coming to serve the community during fair week.

"I believe we have five new food vendors that have not been here before. A couple of them are from Greene County, and we have sampled their items at a couple different county fairs. They do a chicken and noodle meal, and

some other kinds of sandwiches and sides, and it is really, really good. We have a new Mexican food truck that will be located by the grandstands. We have at least two new vendors that will have different types of teas and energy drinks, and then there is a new dessert vendor. They will have strawberrv shortcake along with other different kinds of desserts."

He talked about some of the challenges with finding vendors.

"We go out and try to find good vendors for our fair and it can be hard to find. There are a lot of fairs being held in our timeframe, and everyone is competing for vendors. A lot of times, when you secure a vendor they typically don't leave. You will notice here that we have some vendors that have been with us for 30 or 40 years, or even longer."

Marine spoke a little about the newly-constructed grandstands, explaining that decorative solar caps for the railing for the grandstands have been updated.

He then announced that a project to bring in new infield bleachers will take place immediately

following this year's fair.

"We are going to erect basically what you would see at a high school football stadium on the visitor side, the aluminum bleacher system. It's basically 200-feet long and 12 rows high. The announcer's booth will be torn out and there will be a crow's nest built up at the top like a press box you would see at the football fields. It'll be for the announcers. There will be no obstruction of view, which is an issue we have had in the past. We have a fall derby in October, so our hope is to have the new bleachers ready for that.

"It's a project that we are fortunate to get some assistance from our county and some assistance from the state and Department of Agriculture, along with some fundraising on our part. It's about a \$260,000 or \$270,000 project, but it will bring us up to date and give us something safe. We are excited to start this project as soon as the fair is over."

New this year to the fair this year is a Wood Carver show that will run Wednesday through Saturday. There will be daily shows for all to see.

# **Devin Henry to perform at Fayette County Fair**

On Monday, July 15, rising country artist Devin Henry will provide the evening entertainment at the McDonald's Grandstands during the 145th Annual Fayette County Fair. The performance is set to begin at 7:30 p.m. and is sponsored by Vallery and Dorn Insurance.

Devin Henry is an Appalachian-bred artist from Southeastern Ohio who is quickly making a name for himself in the music industry. He brings an exciting new sound to the table, drawing on his Southern heritage, while paying respect to the bands and the sounds that have influenced his generation. His take on country music might best be described as a cross between CMT and MTV, as it seeks to combine the best of both worlds - the swagger of small towns, with a devil-may-care attitude. That attitude, and his self-made, organic rise in the country scene embodies the spirit of small-town America.

As an independent artist Devin has shared bills with some of the biggest names in the industry, including Parmalee, Blackhawk, Russell Dickerson, Eric Paslay, Travis Denning, Ray Fulcher, Carter Winter, and more, on renowned stages and venues across the midwest. Devin is also an ambassador for the On Our Sleeves organization, a Nationwide Children's Hospital group focused on children's mental health. As an advocate for suicide prevention, Devin has had an opportunity to show that there is more behind all of the music - there is also a message.

His latest release "Legends" (9/29/23) is a country-rock anthem that pays homage to the days of rolling around with burnt CD's and Black Ice Little Trees. If you're not catching him live on tour, this hot new single can be found on all streaming platforms including Spotify, Apple Music, and Amazon Music.

Henry was raised in a musically-inclined family, with many vocalists and instrumentalists to gather inspiration from, including a great-grandfather and uncle that played at the Ryman Auditorium opening for Little Jimmy Dickens when it was still the Grand Ole Opry. And while a talented athlete and gifted student growing up, it wouldn't be long before Devin was walking in the footsteps of his forefathers. After playing college football and completing nursing school, the 26-year-old has remained in Columbus, Ohio, to pursue his passion for music in one of the fastest growing country music scenes.

His parents never miss a show and are very much a part of his crew, his dad playing in the band and mom overseeing management. Devin doesn't care for labels, and he's not letting his music be put into a box. In addition to being a featured artist on iHeart radio and partnering with 92.3 WCOL (Ohio's #1 country music radio station), Devin has a performance residency with The O on Lane, a world-famous Ohio State football tailgate, formerly known as Hineygate. This partnership has grown the event year-over-year into a premier event for the entire campus area during the football season. Devin Henry may very well be the next unheard of, unfound artist that you discovered before anyone else, but you can't wait to tell your friends about.
